INTERIM CONFERENCE, RN7 (SOCIOLOGY OF CULTURE)

EUROPEAN SOCIOLOGICAL ASSOCIATION

25-27 AUGUST 2014, TAMPERE FINLAND

The 2014 Interim Conference of RN7, the Research Network on the Sociology of Culture of the European Sociological Association, will be held from 25-27 August 2014, in conjunction with the conference on "Power, Culture, and Economy,"the fourth in a series of highly successful conferences on Power organized by the University of Tampere in Finland. (http://www.uta.fi/yky/en/power2014/index.html)

The grand theme of this conference—power, culture, and economy—encompasses the core of cultural sociology and opens limitless paths of inquiry for members of the Research Network. These three topics are of course interlinked not only with each other, but also with a fourth, that of civic solidarity. As the more general call for papers suggests, these interlinkages can be explored sociologically with reference to field theory, actor-network theory, or poststructuralism; they can also be explored with reference to more traditional approaches, such as structuralism, structuration theory, systems theory, critical theory, symbolic interactionism, and semiotic theory. A major challenge of the conference is to surface the points of agreement and contradiction among these divergent approaches and indeed among different disciplines, with respect to an accumulating body of empirical evidence.

How does culture help ground politics, economics, and civic life; and how do they in turn help ground culture? Politics and economics are realms of compulsion; within limits of ecological constraint, culture is a realm of relative freedom. Cultural analysis cuts through to the root issues of freedom and necessity, existence and identity. Culture is of special relevance to power, economics, and civic life because it has the capacity to de-naturalize and re-envision categories of understanding them.

The concept of culture is no less contested than culture itself. The sessions devoted to cultural sociology should contribute to a focus on the semantic tensions framing that concept. In what ways is it a *structure*, or a site of *agency*? *Instrumental* or *expressive*? *Essential* or *constructed*? *Global* or *local*? *Repressive* or *emancipatory*? These semantic tensions play out variably (and not as simple binaries), according to the specifics of the empirical case.

We welcome case studies, statistical analyses, and other empirical investigations along with more theoretical exegeses relevant to the concept of culture. Of course, we welcome submissions of any empirical or theoretical orientation. Members of the Board of the Research Network will judge submissions on the basis of the significance of the research problem (i.e., the degree to which it alters the conversation about culture, power, economics, and the civic sphere), the cogency of the proposal, and the strength of warrant of the evidence considered.

This listing enables us to establish an entire *stream* of sessions, including any number of proposed papers. You are invited to submit your own **session proposals** (of 100-250 words) on that website **before March 15** at the latest. The website will accept **paper proposals** (for "The Sociology of Culture" or any other session) **from March 20 until June 15, 2014**.

Education and citizenship: theoretical issues, policies and practices

The Research Network of Sociology of Education is pleased to invite abstracts on the subject of Education and Citizenship for its mid-term conference to be held in Lisbon, Portugal.

Socialisation, and in particular citizenship, has been a goal of the education system in the Western World since its establishment and increasingly so since the Second World War. Through 'socialisation' and civic education, society sets up and reinforces relations among and between individuals and their political community. Marshall's work in the 1940's introduced the distinction between civil, political and social rights within citizenship. Some theorists argue that citizenship is a 'unifying' concept which entails both rights and duties, in a two-way permanent exchange so these concepts should be seen in relation to one another. In the last decades, the rapid societal changes taking place in the areas of globalization, human mobility, normative and cultural pluralism, etc. put a pressure on the traditional basis of citizenship (the national and "natural" belonging), transforming it into a new "cultural" and negotiated object.

More recent approaches such as multiculturalism and feminism also construct citizenship in a slightly different manner than in the past: citizenship becomes a key issue even for personal identity, combining particular and universal properties. These critiques interrogate the power of the institution of education whereby younger members of society are trained for meaningful, wide-ranging societal participation when they are adults. Formal, non-formal and informal agencies are committed to this task, not only by transmitting universal values but also by asking each future citizen to prove actively his/her civic-mindedness, as a basis for rights' recognition ("active welfare state" paradigm). Such an important role is greatly constrained as economic issues result in less resources becoming available to schools while at the same time, schools are put under pressure to perform better, without a clear understanding of the measurable outcomes or added benefits of these changes.

Your paper may deal with some or all of the following key issues:

- How is schooling affected by these changes?
- How do schools react to diminished resources?
- How is the "new", multiple, open, global citizenship treated by the reformed curricula throughout the different national systems?
- How is active citizenship practised at all levels of education? What are the results and constraints of such active citizenship?

- Are students of different ages receptive to issues related to active and multiple citizenships? How do they perceive or construct (even informally) their relationship with the public sphere?
- What is the impact of citizenship education on students' achievement?
- What new challenges are arising as a result of these changes?
- How do communities and other interested groups resist financial cuts and how do they cooperate with schools in citizenship education?
- What is the role of parenthood in the construction of an active citizenship education? Is the school-family relation being affected by these changes?

The world has experienced a global crisis of capitalism that started in 2008 and is continuing until now. It has been accompanied by a crisis of the state and a general crisis of legitimation of dominant ideologies such as neoliberalism. Responses to the crisis have been variegated and have included austerity measures of the state that have hit the weakest, an increased presence of progressive protests, revolutions and strikes that have made use of digital, social and traditional media in various ways, the rise of far-right movements and parties in many parts of Europe and other parts of the world, the Greek state's closing down of public service broadcaster ERT and increased commercial pressure on public service broadcasting in general, new debates about how to strengthen public service media, increased socio-economic and class inequality in many parts of the world and at a global level, precarious forms of work in general and in the media and cultural industries in particular, the emergence of new media reform movements, an extension and intensification of the crisis of newspapers and the print media, an increasing shift of advertising budgets to targeted ads on the Internet and along with this development the rise of commercial "social media" platforms, Edward

Snowden's revelations about the existence of a global surveillance-industrial complex that operates a communications surveillance system called "Prism" that involves the NSA and media companies such as Google, Facebook, Microsoft, Yahoo!, AOL, Skype, Apple and Paltalk; discussions about the power and freedom of the press in light of the Levenson inquiry, shifting geographies of the political and media landscape that have to do with the economic rise of countries such as China and India.

Given this context, the main questions that ESA RN18's 2014 conference asks and to which it invites contributions are: How has the crisis affected the media and communication landscape in Europe and globally and what perspectives for the future of media and communications are there? What suggestions for media reforms are there? How feasible are they? What kind of media policies and reforms do we need today? Which ones should be avoided? Are we in this context likely to experience a renewal of neoliberalism or something different?

ESA RN18 welcomes submissions of abstracts for contributions. Questions that can for example be addressed include, but are not limited to the following ones:

* Media and capitalism:

How have capitalism and the media changed in recent years? Are there perspectives beyond capitalism and capitalist media? How can we best use critical/Marxist political economy and other critical approaches for understanding the media and capitalism today? What is the role of media and communication technologies in the financialization, acceleration, and globalization of the capitalist economy? What are the conditions of working in the media, cultural and communication industries in the contemporary times? What is the role of Marx today for understanding crisis, change, capitalism, communication, and critique?

* Media reform and media policy in times of crisis:

How do the media need to be reformed and changed in order to contribute to the emergence of a good society? Which media reform movements are there and what are their goals? What have been policy ideas of how to overcome the crisis and deal with contemporary changes in relation to European media and communication industries? What can we learn from recent discussions about the media's power and freedom, such as the Leveson inquiry? What are implications for media reforms?

* Media and the public sphere:

How should the concept of the public sphere best be conceived today and how does it relate to the media? How has the public sphere changed during the crisis in Europe and globally? What has been the relation between public and commercial broadcasting during and after the crisis? How have public service media changed, which threats and opportunities does it face? How can/should public service be renewed in the light of crisis, the Internet, and commercialisation? Can public service be extended from broadcasting to the online realm, digital and social media? What has been the role of public service media in Europe? How has this role transformed?

* Media and activism:

How can media scholars best cooperate with activists in order to contribute to a better media system and a better society? What are major trends in media activism today and how do activists use and confront the media and how do commercial, public and alternative media relate to contemporary social movements? What have been important experiences of media activists and media reform organisations in the past couple of years? What are the opportunities, risks, limits and possibilities of media activism today? For answering these questions, we also invite contributions and submissions by media activists, who want to talk about and share their experiences.

* Media ownership:

Who owns the media and ICTs? What are peculiar characteristics of knowledge and the media as property? What conflicts and contradictions are associated with it and how have they developed in times of crisis? How concentrated are the media and ICTs and how has this concentration changed since the start of the 2008 crisis? How has media and ICT ownership, convergence, de-convergence and concentration developed since the start of the 2008 crisis? What reforms of media and ICT ownership are needed in light of the crisis of capitalism and the crisis of intellectual property rights?

* Media and crisis:

What have been the main consequences of the crisis for media and communication in various parts of the world and Europe from a comparative perspective? What role have the media played in the construction of the crisis? How have the media conveyed the social and economic crises of recent years to citizens and what are the consequences of this flow of ideas and explanations? What role can they play in overcoming the crisis? What is the relationship of the media and class during and after the crisis? What role have ideologies (such as racism, right-wing extremism, fascism, neoliberalism, anti-Semitism, etc) played in the media during the crisis and what can we learn from it for reforming the media? How have audiences interpreted media contents that focus on austerity, crisis, neoliberalism, protests, revolutions, or media reforms?

* The globalisation of the media and society:

What are major trends in the globalisation of capitalism, society and the media? Given the globalisation of media and society, what are challenges for media and society today? What can we learn from non-Western media scholars and media cultures outside of Europe? Are concepts such as cultural/media imperialism, transnational cultural domination or the new imperialism feasible today and if so, in which ways?

* Digital and social media:

What is digital labour and how has class changed in the context of social and digital media? What is the connection of value creation, knowledge labour and digital labour? How do the global dimension and the global division of digital labour look like, especially in respect to China, India, Asia and Africa? How do new forms of exploitation and unremunerated labour ("free labour", "crowdsourcing") look like in the media sector (e.g. in the context of Internet platforms such as Facebook or Google)? What is the relationship of the commons and commodification on digital and social media? How do capital accumulation and targeted advertising work on social media and what are their implications for users and citizens? What are alternatives to capitalist digital and social media? How can alternative social and digital media best look like and be organized? What can in this context be the roles of the digital commons, civil society media and public service media? Which ideologies of the Internet and social media are there? How can we best understand the surveillance-industrial Internet complex operated by the NSA together with Internet corporations such as Google and Facebook and what are the implications of Edward Snowden's revelations? How do power and political economy work in the context of platforms such as Google, Facebook, Twitter, YouTube, WikiLeaks, Wikipedia, Weibo, LinkedIn, Blogspot/Blogger, Wordpress, VK, Pinterest, Tumblr, Instagram, etc?

* Media and Critical Social Theory:

What can we learn and use from critical sociology and the sociology of critique when studying the media? What do critique and critical theory mean in contemporary times? What are critical sociology and the sociology of critique and what are its roles for studying media and communication's role in society? Which social theories do we need today for adequately understanding media & society in a critical way? What is the role of political economy and Marx's theory for understanding media & society today?

* Communication and (Post-)Crisis:

How has the crisis affected the communication landscape in Europe and globally and what perspectives for the future are there? How do the working conditions in communication industries look like after the crisis? What are the challenges for communication industries in the near future in the context of the crisis and post-crisis? What is the role of post-crisiscommunication industries in a globalised economy?

Professor Steven Brint, University of California at Riverside

RESEARCH FUNDING & THE DYNAMICS OF SCIENCE

Workshop

Organized by Research Network 24 - Sociology of Science and Technology Network (SSTNET) of the European Sociological Association (ESA) and the Centre for Science and Technology Studies (CWTS) at Leiden University, The Netherlands:

12-13 June 2014, Faculty of Social Sciences, Leiden University, The Netherlands

Today, more and more public research funding is allocated via competitive, external and peerreviewed mechanisms. This is accompanied by a fast growth rate in the number of scholars with academic career ambitions and a shift from tenure to temporary positions. In this turbulent environment, securing external research (projects and personal) grants has become prominent criteria in academic recruitment, evaluation and promotion processes in science.

In this two-day workshop we will discuss the impact of research funding on various levels and dimensions in the science system. For example, many EU-funded but also national research programmes require researchers to collaborate as a condition for securing research funding; they encourage collaboration with partners outside academia and they are oriented towards problems and themes not generated within science. These tendencies in public research funding as well as the growths of the private research funding are connected with the commercialization of science and an expansion of the entrepreneurial role of the academic institutions. The increasing presence of such types of research funding, therefore, may influence collaborative behaviour, the time frames of research, and the types of questions asked.

We particularly encourage contributions on the following topics:

- Research funding policies & funding agencies in academia
- Public and private research funding and wider impact of research
- Public and private research funding and innovation
- New metrics knowledge production and research funding
- Research funding and culture & organization in academia
- The impact of research funding on the recruitment & selection of scientists
- Funding agencies' impact on scientists
- Research funding and research performance
- Developments in research careers and funding of the research
- Research networks within and outside academia and public funding of science
- The influence of research funding on the mobility of researchers within and outside science
- Gender differences in science and research funding

ESA 'Youth and Generation Research Network' MidTerm Conference 2014:

'Negotiation, navigation, resistance - young people's agency in post-crisis reality in Europe'

September 10th-13th 2014, in Kluszkowce, near Krakow, Poland

Call for papers

Young people have been hit harshly by the economic crisis in Europe, mostly by the difficult labour market situation, which has impacted their transitions, their quality of life and also the feelings of security. Consequently, in recent years, the analysis within youth studies has paid much attention to the structural conditions of young people lives and resulting inequalities. To counterbalance this tendency, though not to undermine the impact of structural conditions on young people's lives, we propose to consider young people as active agents, to examine the ways they might overcome/reconstruct/renegotiate the constellations within which they live their lives. The conference encourages the debate on tensions and interrelations between structure and agency in young people's lives, while also concentrating on re-discovering youth agency within European youth studies, looking at young people as a dynamic body or as individuals finding the spaces for self-expression and change, or as initiators of conflicts or protests. Youth as a life stage has been associated with boldness and rebellion, as well as innovation, imagination, fun or creativity; to what extent do the current conditions allow for the expression and realisation of these values by young people? The therapeutic community can be defined as a micro social system whose purpose is to produce health for those who come into contact with enter it. It is a community that is artificially constructed in order to compensate for the shortcomings of the community of origin of people with serious mental disturbances. It operates primarily by means of non-specific factors such as a particular emotional climate, modality of welcoming and hosting, and approach to conflict resolution. But is the need for belonging and community specific to psychiatric patients or is it a more general requirement of the entire social body? The emergence and proliferation of communities is a striking aspect of modernity, whether it be a local neighborhood community, or that of the family, of ex-patriate Filipinos, golf players, those who live in a condominium, the facebook community, the community of students, or the community of bikers, etc.

But is it always true that a **Community**, for the simple reason of being one, generates capital gains of well-being and health and distributes its dividends to its members? What does it ask for in return? What responsibilities does it impose? What are the side effects of life in the community and which of them are avoidable? What is the relationship between the cultural changes of a society and the manifestations of new forms of psychological malaise?

What needs to happen in order for a set or a **group** to become a **Community**? Is there a special factor which turns a group into a Community? When does this factor become an opportunity and when does this it become a symptom?

It seems that the more globalized a society becomes the more there is a tendency towards the manifestation, by contrast, of the need to reconstitute or reinvent certain "situations" that - whatever they may be and regardless of whether or not they may have therapeutic goals - seem to endeavor to reproduce the elements of greatest social cohesion and intimacy. It is possible that, within a social system that seems to favour the breaking of bonds and connections by pushing relationships in individualistic directions, various collective structures with different ordering principles can be established, which counteract those forces and provide alternative models based on ideals of solidarity and participation.

ReThinking Management 2014: The Impact of Cultural Turns

Management thinking and management practice are largely influenced by traditional economic approaches that seek to conceptualize the economy positivistically and functionalistically according to rational-objectivist principles. For a longer time and in light of present crises, there has been no lack of calls for fundamental reformations of the economics and management theory, to conceive them anew as part of the social sciences and humanities. Although initial attempts for such reorientation and reconceptualization are evident, they are still in their infancy and in need for further advancement and realisation.

With the establishment of fields such as critical management studies (cf. Spicer, Alvesson, and Kärreman 2009) or the cultural economy (cf. Grossberg 2010) in academia, new ways of thinking and approaches have developed that supplement and often go against mainstream management theory and practice. What these approaches have in common is that they all are trying, in very different ways, to open up management for cultural studies, the social sciences and the humanities and to promote, in a broad sense, an independent "cultural turn" both for corporate and management theory as well as for management practice.

The conference on "ReThinking Management 2014: The Impact of Cultural Turns" begins with these orientations and pursues the goal of initiating a systematic dialog between current core concepts of the social sciences, humanities and management theory and practice. Here, in the spirit of Bachmann-Medick (2010), we believe that "cultural turns" are to be conceived as a plurality today. Following the general orientation of the humanities and social sciences towards culturally relevant issues, the plural "cultural turns" represent current moves, or new orientations that cut across and go beyond the cultural sciences. Topics and concepts such as performance, materiality, embodiment, space, mediality, narration, and sense-making as well as translation, interculturality and transculturality, have moved more and more into the forefront in the last few decades.

"ReThinking Management 2014: The Impact of Cultural Turns" pursues the main idea that management theory is not to be understood as a sub-discipline of economic sciences, but rather as an inter- and trans-disciplinary field with a decidedly cultural perspective. In fact, the topics and concepts listed above, along with related issues, questions and methods, play an increasingly important role. Their relevance, potential, and influence both in management theory as well as in practice are the central foci of this conference.

With this call, we want to invite researchers and practitioners from various disciplines and fields who share the outlined understanding. There are different policies of school choice but often similar outcomes in terms of differentiation of schools by socio-economic background of pupils.

Large surveys or governmental school datasets allow for statistical analysis of such differentiation. To study choice criteria and decision-making scholars tend to employ small samples and qualitative methods. Parents and students are choosing schools, but schools also often have subtle ways of selecting students whom they find suitable. The exchange of perspectives – national, theoretical and methodological - will help participants in their own research.

Présentation

Au croisement de la sociologie, de l'anthropologie, de la psychologie et de l'histoire, l'objectif de ce colloque pluridisciplinaire est de susciter des échanges entre disciplines et champs de recherche autour de la question du corps et des normes corporelles. Plus précisément, cet appel à communication propose d'explorer les processus de régulation sociale¹ des normes corporelles sous l'angle de la (re)production des différences et de l'altérité. Son objectif est d'engager une réflexion sur le corps comme lieu d'imposition et/ou de subversion de normes corporelles au sein des rapports sociaux de sexe/genre, de classe et interethniques/de « race », mais aussi en lien avec d'autres critères tels que l'âge, le handicap, la religion ou l'orientation sexuelle. Nous nous intéresserons particulièrement aux approches du corps et des normes corporelles proposant une lecture en termes d'articulation des rapports sociaux ou d'intersectionnalité.

Depuis le travail de Michel Foucault (de *Surveiller et punir*, 1975, à *l'Histoire de la sexualité*, 1984), de nombreuses recherches se sont intéressées aux processus sociaux explicites et implicites qui participent à réguler, normaliser et contrôler les corps, mais aussi aux processus de subversion et de transformation par lesquels les individus composent avec les normes corporelles ou y résistent (Goffman 1977 [1963]). Les normes corporelles apparaissent en effet comme un outil de contrôle social, les corps faisant l'objet d'un tri sociétal et institutionnel impliquant une différenciation, une hiérarchisation (corps sains/malades ; civilisés/sauvages ; culturels/naturels), voire une mise à l'écart symbolique et matérielle des « Autres » (ouvriers, pauvres, femmes, étrangers, malades...). Dans cette optique, nous ne négligerons pas la dimension sensorielle à l'oeuvre dans l'incorporation ou l'expression des normes corporelles. Les stimuli sensoriels jouent en effet un rôle non négligeable, souvent à notre insu, dans les processus de catégorisation sociale, notamment sous la forme de jugements moraux et de stéréotypes (raciaux, ethniques, de genre, d'âge, sociaux, etc.), ce que Joël Candau a appelé un essentialisme sensoriel (2013).

Les normes corporelles, en ce qu'elles participent à la hiérarchisation symbolique et matérielle des corps, sont ainsi centrales dans la (re)production et la naturalisation des rapports sociaux de classe, de « race », de sexe, etc. et dans les résistances qu'elles impliquent.

Les études portant sur les rapports de classe ont par exemple montré l'usage des normes corporelles dans les processus d'exploitation de classe et dans les processus de distinction sociale (Bourdieu 1979). De même, les études féministes ou de genre rendent compte des processus de régulation sociale des corps sur la base du sexe, du genre ou de la sexualité (Delphy 1998, 2001 ; Foucault 1984 ; Guillaumin 1992 ; Mathieu 1991). Les normes corporelles sont ainsi un enjeu central dans les représentations et catégorisations sociales instituant la « différence naturelle » des sexes (la « nature » supposée des femmes, l'hétéronormativité), mais aussi dans la division sexuelle de l'espace, du travail, des loisirs, de la famille (Cardi 2007 ; Vozari 2012) et dans les formes de résistance ou de contournement de ces injonctions (la subversion des normes de genre et de sexualité (Dorlin 2009).

¹ La régulation sociale est entendue comme les processus d'imposition, de maintien et de négociation des règles et normes sociales.

De nombreux travaux ont également montré la régulation des corps selon des différenciations « raciales », ethniques et nationales dans les rapports esclavagistes, coloniaux (Clancy Smith 2006 ; Fanon 1952 ; Stoler 2013 ; Taraud 2003), mais aussi dans les contextes contemporains, autour de la (re)production des frontières – tant géopolitiques qu'ethniques, tant matérielles (mise à l'écart, enfermement) que symboliques (construction de l'altérité) (Fassin 2010 ; Guénif 2005 ; Poutignat & Streiff-Fénart 1999 ; Sayad 2006, 1999). En ce sens, les travaux portant sur le renforcement des frontières nationales et aujourd'hui européennes face aux migrations interrogent la dimension du corps, à la fois dans les modes de catégorisation des non-nationaux ou non-européens et dans les modes de contrôle, de mise à l'écart ou de rétention produits par les Etats et les réglementations européennes. Ici encore, les normes corporelles racisées, ethniques, nationales ou culturelles peuvent donner lieu à des usages subversifs de la part des groupes minorisés : des tactiques d'invisibilisation au retournement du stigmate (« black is beautiful ») et à l'expression identitaire par les corps.

Outre les assignations corporelles symboliques ou matérielles (re)produites au sein des rapports sociaux de classe, de sexe et de « race », d'autres catégories participent de la production de l'altérité, des frontières ou des discriminations. Ainsi des travaux récents (Bessin & Blidon 2012) montrent que l'âge est également une catégorie de classement à laquelle sont associées des caractéristiques sociales et des normes corporelles. Il en va de même pour les catégories relatives au handicap ou à l'apparence physique qui peuvent, elles aussi, fonctionner comme des « stigmates » (Goffman 1977), c'est-à-dire avant tout comme des écarts aux normes corporelles dominantes.

Enfin, les courants récents portant sur les approches « intersectionnelles » (Anthias 2013, Creshaw 1991) ou imbriquées des rapports de pouvoir ont montré l'intérêt de considérer la combinaison de ces rapports sociaux et de ces catégories (Bilge 2009 ; Yuval Davis & Anthias 1992). Ainsi, la régulation des corps selon des classements de genre et de classe sociale (Kergoat 2009), combinés aux catégorisations ethniques (Delphy 2008 ; Falquet et al. 2006 ; Guénif & Macé 2006 ; Juteau 1999 ; Sarah Banet-Wieser 1999 ; Scrinzi 2008 ; Stoler 2002) ou nationales (Dorlin 2007 ; Fassin 2006 ; Juteau 2000 ; Varikas 1998 ; Yuval-Davis & Anthias 1992) ainsi qu'à d'autres formes de classement tels que l'âge ou le handicap, constituent autant d'objets d'analyse particulièrement pertinents.

Dans cet appel, nous nous intéresserons en particulier à des contextes ou à des lieux institutionnels au sein desquels les normes corporelles apparaissent comme des enjeux d'importance, que ce soit à travers des formes de sublimation et de savoir des corps (les institutions sportives), des formes de construction et de prise en charge de la vulnérabilité, à travers des pratiques d'accompagnement ou de soin (les institutions médicales et de travail social, de care) ou des formes de contrôle physique ou répressif du corps (les institutions d'enfermement à vocation punitive, préventive ou de rétention administrative). De fait, chacune de ces institutions présente des logiques propres, de par son histoire, ses règles et ses pratiques internes. Mais elles partagent peut-être la caractéristique d'être des lieux où le « langage du pouvoir » s'ancre dans la normalisation des corps (Foucault 1976) et contribuent à modeler les corps, ses usages et ses pratiques, de sorte à (re)produire des rapports sociaux constitutifs de nos sociétés. Il nous importera alors de caractériser les façons dont le corps peut dans ces contextes s'avérer être un objet de discours (médical, psychologique, éducatif administratif, sécuritaire) et de pratiques de régulation, mais aussi un objet d'identification, de transformation ou de résistance.

C'est ainsi que cet appel à communication se propose d'étudier la (re)production de – et la résistance aux – normes corporelles, en ce qu'elles participent à la hiérarchisation symbolique et matérielle des rapports sociaux. Ce, en particulier, dans l'action d'institutions à vocation sanitaire, sportive, sociale et d'enfermement. Ces institutions peuvent s'inscrire non seulement dans des contextes régionaux ou nationaux, mais une attention particulière sera portée aux travaux portant sur une échelle européenne voire internationale.

4 axes principaux, mais non exhaustifs, ont été prévus pour ce colloque. Ils concernent quatre types d'institutions privilégiés, mais d'autres institutions ou domaines d'activité pourront être abordés.

Les institutions de santé publique – qui fabriquent et prennent en charge des vulnérabilités corporelles (Cognet 2012 ; Cognet & Montgomery 2007 ; Fassin 2000, Fassin & Memmi 2004), en ciblant des populations « vulnérables » ou « à risque » (handicap, maternité, maladie).

- Les institutions sportives où la discipline et la différenciation des corps constituent des fondements historiques (Corbin et al. 2011) et réglementaires (Bohuon 2012) et où les rapports sociaux de pouvoir trouvent un terrain d'expression et de mise en scène par les corps (Ferez 2012).
- Les institutions de travail social ou d'intervention sociale qui ciblent également des populations vulnérables/à risque : champ de l'intégration, insertion sociale/professionnelle, parentalité, handicap, personnes âgées, violences faites aux femmes, travail du « care » (Bessin 2009, Vozari 2012).
- Les institutions et lieux de privation de liberté où le contrôle physique des corps est assumé (Foucault 1975), qu'il s'agisse de prévention, de rétention ou de punition. On pense notamment aux institutions de régulation des frontières nationales ou européennes (immigration/intégration) – où les facteurs de classe, de genre, d'origine nationale sont mobilisés dans le tri menant au contrôle physique des corps.

Besides the motives, intervening actors are consists global networks in terms of both institutional organizations such as funding, collaboration etc. and policies and politics that are pursued.

In the context of global networks of corporations, this meeting will limit the topic to Mediterranean region. The aim is to bring together researchers and practitioners working on the intersection of migration and humanitarian issues. Towards a shared conciliation? Facing work-family challenges in a time of crisis and social transformations

Edited by: Paola Bonizzoni (Università degli Studi di Milano), Daniela Falcinelli (Università degli Studi di Milano), Sveva Magaraggia (Università degli Studi di Milano-Bicocca)

This monographic issue aims to encourage scholars belonging to different disciplines (such as sociology, political science, philosophy) to reflect upon work-family reconciliation dilemmas rooted in

some radical tensions and social transformations observed in contemporary societies, both in the sphere of work and in the one of intimate relationships.

Over the last few years, the economic crisis, rising rates of work precarity and unemployment – especially among young people – are amplifying class and gender inequalities. These radical social changes are modifying – on the one hand – individual work choices and strategies and – on the other hand – the possible solutions and resources offered (or imposed) by work organizations and welfare states.

At the same time, a profound transformation of family structures and ways of "doing family" can be observed in contemporary European societies. Non-traditional family forms – such as same-sex, single and divorced parents, step-parents and blended families, let alone migrant and ethnic minority households (both local, transnational and "living apart together") – are in fact being increasingly recognized by scholars. These micro and macro social transformations can have a great impact on the strategies men and women follow in order to balance work, family and private life, as well as on gender roles, even though the specificity of their reconciliation practices still has to be explored in full detail.

Much work on family-reconciliation have, in fact, conceived it as a matter concerning first and foremost (when not exclusively) women, also normalizing the experience of white, middle class heterosexual two-parent families in stable jobs. We also ask therefore whether it could be more effective to speak about sharing or shared conciliation, the terms more often used in the debate (such as balancing, or flexibility) being strongly centered on women's unpaid labor.

The aim of this monographic issue is to grasp these transformations in order to better understand whether the discourse about healing the wide gap between being parents and being workers shall change, and if so, in what way, reflecting on how care and domestic responsibilities are shared under these new circumstances, and shifting the work-family reconciliation debate to some new, urgent and under-researched issues.

- Do the *recent transformations in the sphere of work* (rising rates of precarity, self-employment, informality, low-wage jobs, layoffs...) lead to new experiences (in terms of challenges, resources and strategies) of doing reconciliation? How do growing economic inequalities impact on work -family and private life reconciliation processes? How do partners belonging to different social classes share?

- How do *new family forms* face the work-family reconciliation challenge? How do same-sex couples and parents, families after having experienced separation or divorce, step-parents and blended families, care for their children and elderly? How do increasingly mobile (migrant, pluri-local, transnational...) families manage care and domestic responsibilities? Do their experiences lead us to acknowledge innovative ways of "doing reconciliation" or to new inequalities and forms of exclusion?

- How do these changes *impact on the meaning care and caring* have for people and societies? What meanings are imbued with the dimension of care, of caring for the future of other people (i.e. dependent relatives and fragile subjects) in an environment of increasingly precarious time horizons for both life and work? Which potential for change can we grasp in masculinities and femininities when care is practiced under different, and new, family conditions? We are pleased to invite papers for consideration in the Sociology Editor's Special Issue in 2015. The theme will be the Sociologies of Everyday Life.

Everyday life sociology is a well-established tradition in the discipline and interest in ways of understanding day-to-day worlds continues to be significant. These engagements are becoming increasingly interdisciplinary, across the social sciences as well as outside them. It is in this context that the 2015 Special Issue aims to provide a timely opportunity to take stock. This is intended to be a reflective moment – where has sociology arrived at in its attempts to think through the everyday? It is also intended to be an anticipative moment – what are the new logics, foci, approaches, uses, limits of sociologies of the everyday?

Sociological approaches to everyday life attempt to capture and recognize the mundane, the routines in (and of) social relations and practices. In doing so they not only give importance to the ordinary and take the ordinary seriously as a category of analysis, but they also highlight that everyday life social relations, experiences and practices are rarely simply or straightforwardly mundane, ordinary and routine. Rather they are dynamic and surprising, characterized by ambivalences, perils, puzzles, contradictions and possibilities and continually influenced by things, contexts and environments. From Simmel's money, De Certeau's resistances, Elias' manners, the relationalities of Bourdieu, ANT's interdependencies to a more recent focus on the experiential and the sensory, it is evident that the micro, ordinary, banal and the familiar constitute, and are constitutive, of the wider complexities, structures and processes of the contemporary social world. In short, everyday life can be thought of as the site of translations and adaptions in which the social gets to be made - and unmade.

Recently Sarah Pink (2012)1 has helpfully noted that the rise of interest in, research into and publication on everyday life - the hidden, the slight, ordinary, the mundane - effectively stops it being 'hidden'. But in many ways recognizing this also confirms the seduction of everyday life as a field of

sociological and interdisciplinary inquiry – the more extensive the gaze, the more apparent the complexity and the compelling nature of the field.

We aim to be able to collect together a series of papers that variously reflect the breadth and diversity of sociology's enchantments and engagements with everyday worlds as well as the imaginative and innovative ways in which the discipline has sought to analyze and respond to it.

We invite papers that explore, through the lens of everyday life, one or more of the following indicative themes and/or areas:

Summer School, 23–27 June 2014, Frankfurt am Main Multiple Inequalities in the Age of Transnationalization: Implications for Concepts and Methods

Place: Goethe University Frankfurt, Faculty of Social Sciences, Institute of Sociology Organizers: Anna Amelina, Helma Lutz, Kira Kosnick Jointly organized with the "Migration and Ethnic Minorities" section of the German Sociological Association

In recent years, transnational social inequalities have become one of the most debated subjects in many disciplines, including gender studies, the sociology of social inequality and migration studies. Concepts such as *transnational capitalist class, cosmopolitan and transnational elites, global care chains, transnational gender orders, transnational care regimes* and *queer transnationalism* situate inequality analysis in the context of cross-border relations and practices, emphasizing that it is necessary to better understand the impacts of global and transnational relations on the production and reproduction of inequality.

The aim of the Summer School will be to intensify the dialogue between researchers who work on intersectionality and transnationality. Intersectionality, one of the most important approaches to emerge from the study of multidimensional inequalities, provides a highly valuable conceptual tool for the analysis of the processes (e.g., subordination) and patterns (e.g., hierarchies) involved in the production of inequality. It allows researchers to examine various forms of multiple inequalities in relation to aspects such as gender, ethnicity/race, class, age, disability and sexuality, as well as the interrelations between them. Concepts such as transnational migration and transnational social spaces emphasize that multi-locality has become the dominant mode of life organization for many mobile individuals and their non-mobile significant others. Consequently, the transnational lens suggests that subordination and resistance are organized multi-locally, meaning that the study of the power of definition and symbolic violence, both of which produce multiple inequalities, must go beyond the narrow focus of methodological nationalism.

To promote the dialogue between those who study multiple inequalities and researchers who work on transnationalization, mobility and cross-border migration, the Summer School will focus on the following key questions:

• How are multiple inequalities (in terms of gender, ethncity/race, class, age, disability, sexuality, etc.) produced and reproduced in the process of transnationalization and cross-border mobility?

• How can the multiple discriminations (sexism, racism, ethnicism, classism, ageism, etc.) which often emerge in the form of intersections and in mutual constituency be analysed, conceptualized and theorized in the context of transnational mobility and cross-border relations?

• What forms of (symbolic) violence are inherent in the processes of multiple hierarchization which extend across national borders?

Programme:

The programme combines focused interdisciplinary training for PhD students with an intense discussion of PhD projects, including theory, methodologies and critical perspectives, to give young researchers an opportunity to present their research and discuss it in detail.
