Calls for papers and contributions for the PhD workshop

'Ethics and methodological pitfalls in health research'

To be held on 27th August 2014 prior to the joint ESA RN16, ESHMS and ISA RC 15 conference in Helsinki, Finland.

Whilst investigating the domain of health and illness in the lives of people and modern societies, medical sociologists have always dealt with various aspects of human suffering. Correspondingly, perhaps more than their colleagues working in other fields, they have been faced with specific ethical and methodological questions related to such conditions. However, the specific nature of these issues is rarely a matter for wider discussions in this sub-discipline.

This PhD workshop addresses the need to discuss ethical and methodological questions particular to the field of sociology of health and illness, with a specific aim of helping social science doctoral students and young researchers working in the field, to find appropriate ways of dealing with ethical and methodological dilemmas in their research. The workshop participants will get an opportunity to engage in discussions about their current research projects with other student colleagues as well as with prominent scholars in the sociology of health and illness who will assist them as mentors.

There will be several working groups focussing on topics such as:

- . Researching vulnerable populations
- . Dealing with ethical committees and writing about ethical dilemmas in health research
- . Writing up on and publishing about sensitive topics
- . Methodological pitfalls in investigating sensitive topics
- . Ethnography in medical settings: ethical and methodological dilemmas

Eligibility:

Social science PhD students and young researchers working in the field of health and illness are eligible to apply.

The Venue:

The PhD workshop is co-organized with the ESHMS, ISA RC15 and the University of Helsinki, Finland.

How to apply:

A short abstract (250 up to 300 words) together with a brief biography, including the applicant's institutional affiliation and research interests, should be sent to: <u>newsletter.rn16esa@gmail.com</u>, and in copy to <u>ehresano@kss.zcu.cz</u>, by the **31st March 2014**.

Applicants will be notified about acceptance by the beginning of May. Participants are required to send their full papers (10 to 15 pages) to be distributed to co-participants and mentors by the 1st July 2014. There will be a publishing opportunity for the best papers.

The participants are not required to pay any fees. However, they will be responsible for covering their

own travel and accommodation expenses. The ESA RN16 will be able to provide only a limited number of fellowships to PhD students from economically disadvantaged regions in Europe (please indicate your interest in this application).

Call for Papers

Higher education faces increasing trends of internationalization. A growing part of the faculty at universities (US) and universities of applied science (UAS) has an international background. In parallel the number of students with foreign nationality or a migration background has risen within the last decades. Although much less is known about the situation in higher professional training and education (PET) – a form of higher education widespread in the German-speaking countries – it is likely that PET also faces a growing number of students with migration experiences.

Up to date, little is known about whether and how trends of internationalization in higher education affect social inequality. This holds in particular regarding educational opportunities for young men and women with a migration background and/or foreign nationality and degrees earned abroad. Against this background, the conference will focus on the following questions:

How do gender and migration experiences affect access to the different tracks of higher education (professional education and training (PET), universities of applied science (UAS) and universities (US))? What role do gender and migration experiences play in explaining trajectories and success rates in higher education and the ensuing transition into the labour market? To what extent do tracks of higher education (PET, AUS, US) offer comparable access and success chances for men and women with different social and ethnic backgrounds?

In particular, we seek contributions dealing with the following questions (list not comprehensive):

- How are trends of internationalization incorporated into the structures, procedures and discourses of higher education? How are these trends (socio-politically) related to the subjects of gender and migration? Do gender- and migration-specific opportunities in higher education differ between regions and/or countries?

- How well are the different tracks in higher education (PET, UAS, US) accessible for young men and women from abroad or with a migration background? Do the various training and degree courses and fields of study differ regarding patterns of (gender and ethnic) segregation?

- Which institutional access barriers may be identified for different tracks of higher education? Which institutional barriers exist during the process of education and training and at labour market entry? Which factors determine the use and the returns of higher education degrees (PET, UAS, US)?

- How do students cope with institutional frameworks in higher education? Under which conditions does gender or migration background become a cultural or social resource? - How do the different institutional arrangements in higher education (PET, UAS, US) as well as training strategies of firms affect access rates of different social and ethnic groups?

- What is the significance of gender, nationality and a migration background in professional education and training (PET) – an educational track which has hitherto ben very little investigated?

Abstracts

Please send proposals for oral presentations to Irene Kriesi (<u>irene.kriesi@ehb-schweiz.ch</u>). Abstracts (max. 400 words) should be written in English and include a clear description of the research question, theoretical framework, data, analytical strategy and – if already available – main findings. The deadline for submission is **30 April 2014**. The conference language will be English.

All abstracts will be peer reviewed. Authors will be notified about the outcomes of their submissions by 15 June 2014.

Social boundaries of work. Changes in the sphere of work in the 21st century capitalism

We invite paper proposals for the international conference "Social boundaries of work. Changes in the sphere of work in the 21st century capitalism". The conference will take place at the Institute of sociology, University of Wrocław, on 14-15 November 2014. The goal of the conference is to discuss the changing meaning of human work in the context of economic, institutional and cultural transformations in the sphere of employment in the late capitalist societies. The contemporary debates on flexible labour market and inclusion and exclusion in the sphere of employment in Europe relatively rarely address in a critical manner the social, economic and political mechanisms of the marketisation and commodification of work. The latter mechanisms translate into the social constructions of the differences between work and employment, between standard and non-standard employment, between employment and unemployment and between formality and informality. The ways of investing work with particular meanings by various social actors (employees, employers, political elites, trade unions, labour administration, incl. career counsellors etc.) influence, in turn, the range of social and civic rights enjoyed by the various categories of employees. On the one hand, the new forms of employment and increasingly flexible labour market require new theoretical approaches to understand better the long-term outcomes of ongoing transformations. On the other hand, in order to grasp these transformations and formulate more accurate policy recommendations, it is necessary to move beyond the reductionist identification of work with employment and labour market.

The conference will be organised around two main thematic blocks: (1) a interdisciplinary theoretical panel in which the sociological, philosophical, ethical, legal and economic ways of defining work, labour and employment will be discussed from comparative and historical perspectives; (2) a practical panel for which practitioners active in shaping labour market policies and career counselling will be invited (employers, trade unions, career counsellors, policy-makers).

For the theoretical panel, we invite papers covering following themes:

- historical and contemporary discourses of work, employment, lack of work, "standard" and "non-standard" employment and their social, legal, institutional and cultural foundations and consequences;
- flexible labour in the European Union and periphery, social and biographical costs of the flexibilisation of labour market,
- occupational careers on the flexible labour market, the social and biographical costs of new career patterns;
- precariat and precarisation of work and "bullshit jobs" in low end and high end of the economy;
- work in informal and shadow labour markets;
- migrants and migrant work, the problems of inclusion/exclusion in the labour market;
- unpaid work domestic work, work at home, work for employment, reproductive work, unpaid work in probationary periods, voluntary work;
- non-standard employment and interest representation: theoretical approaches
- legal aspects of work the legal consciousness of employees working with non-standard employment contracts and the respective or envisaged evolutions of the labour law;

We also invite papers to the practical panel which will concern the following themes:

- the work of career counsellors;
- the role of state employment offices and private employment agencies;
- the experiences and problems of employers the benefits and costs of non-standard employment;
- the role of trade unions and civil society organisations in representing the interests of nonstandard employees;
- the challenges of gathering public statistics on the flexible forms of employment in Europe;

The special guest of the conference will be Professor Guy Standing.

Please mark your calendars for the fifth annual conference of the <u>Society for Longitudinal and Life</u> <u>Course Studies</u>(*SLLS*).

Although the overall conference theme will focus on social policy this year, we welcome conference submissions from **all areas of longitudinal and life course studies**: physical, psychological, social developmental and ageing processes and functioning within and across life course stages from infancy to old age; methods and findings of cohort studies; other sources of longitudinal data such as panel studies and record linkage; international comparisons; household, and income dynamics; intergenerational transfers and returns to learning; gene-environment interactions; 'mixed', and comparative methods; innovative methodology in design, measurement, data management, analysis and research practice (quantitative and qualitative).

Proposals are sought for three kinds of conference presentation:

1. A symposium comprising at least 3 papers to be presented in a one and a half hour session or a series of two sessions. For each symposium suggested we require an overall abstract of no more than 300 words plus an abstract of no more than 300 words for each paper. Please provide names and professional affiliations for all presenters.

2. An individual paper for oral presentation for which an abstract of no more than 300 words is required.**

3. A poster presentation for which an abstract of no more than 200 words is required.

** Papers which do not fit into regular sessions may be allocated to Round Table discussion groups or presented as posters.

In recent decades, in spite of a general reduction in the relative number of young people and a general increase in their educational attainment, there has been a worsening of the youth labour market situation in the OECD area (Preparing Youth for the 21st Century, OECD 2011). Such worsening is reflected in earnings, the relative risk of unemployment or underemployment and the delay in attaining

a significant job. The on-going economic crisis has unfortunately deepened this process, making the need for research on transition from school to work even more pressing.

The 22nd Annual Workshop Transitions In Youth (TIY) will focus on the effect of the ongoing economic crisis on the prospects of young people at the point of entry into the labour market. Three broad areas will receive particular attention:

- Impact of the crisis on educational participation. The Workshop welcomes research on the effect of the crisis on the length of the educational career and on transition difficulties early school leavers. Due to an increasing demand for skills in the labour market, this group has become more prone to exclusion and persistently poor labour market performance.
- Dimensions of the education-to-work transition. Special attention will be paid to the increasing phenomenon of NEET ('not in employment, education or training'), a phenomenon particularly prevalent amongst youth during the current recession. Other dimensions of interest are earnings, job security, occupational attainment, working conditions, or the effects of the crisis on the geographical and occupational mobility of school leavers, with a particular attention to the issue of over-education and over-skilling.
- Effects of the education-to-work transition in terms of poverty, family formation and political participation. Finally, the Workshop welcomes contributions that address the consequences of the ongoing crisis for well-being, family formation, health and political participation.

The organisation encourages comparative research on the extent to which the growing risks mentioned above (early school leaving, discouragement, unemployment, low-paid work, adverse working conditions, geographical mobility, overskilling etc.) are unequally distributed across gender, ethnic origin and levels of education, and the institutional and political factors explaining cross-national differences.

ABSTRACT:

Looking at the history of social movements, we may identify periods during which these actors have prevalently opposed the dominant power structure directly by using protest actions (i.e. conflicting and resisting the dominant socio-economic structure), and periods in which movements have prevalently proposed and sustained forms of self-help and self-production – mutualism, economic cooperativism – i.e. developing their resilience through commoning.

Like in the past, the mobilizing capacity of social movements to this day is conditioned by the environment within which these actors operate. The degree of openness/closedness of political, economic and cultural opportunities not only affects the action strategies adopted by these collective actors, but also their organizational structure.

In the current economic crisis, social movements simultaneously face two types of challenge: firstly, they are confronting institutions which are less able (or willing) to mediate new demands for social justice and equity from various sectors of society in the wake of the successful neo-liberal attack on the social welfare system and the consequent retreat of the state; secondly, giving the highly individualized structure of contemporary society, they also experiencing difficulties in building strong and lasting bonds of solidarity and cooperation among people, bonds which constitute a fundamental resource for collective action.

It is in this context that potentially huge protest waves are in fact often short-lived, and it is here that we see the rise and consolidation of new mutualistic and cooperative experiences within which (like in the past) new ties for collective action are created. Apart from spectacular events given special attention by the media, over recent decades it has in fact been at the local level in particular that social movements have continued to expand, promoting community-led initiatives for social and economic sustainability, which in some cases have played a decisive role in the fight against poverty and in defending human and environmental rights.

Such organizations include those promoting solidarity-based exchanges and networks, barter groups, new consumer-producer cooperatives, time banks, microfinance, local savings groups, ethical banks, alternative social currency, citizens' self-help groups, pro-sumption practices, solidarity purchasing groups, social enterprises, fair trade, and others communing practices.

Grassroots economic activism sprang up during the economic crisis in Argentina and other Latin American regions. Similar initiatives also developed in Europe before and after the 2008 crisis – e.g. the flourishing of local currencies and barter networks in Greece and Spain; the Plataforma contra los Desahaucios and the citizens' assemblies in neighbourhoods which help residents with foreclosure/housing issues in Spain; the alternative cashless production and exchange systems such as the Local Exchange Trading Systems (LETS) in the UK; the GAS (Gruppi di Acquisto Solidale) groups in Italy; the French AMAPs (Associations pour le Maintien d'une Agriculture Paysanne) and the CSA (Community-Supported Agriculture) movement which started in Europe and spread to the U.S.; the so-called Transition Town Movement, as well as more radical groups promoting degrowth and nowutopias. All these networks and practices attest to a new kind of politics through the creation of bottom-up participatory initiatives promoting a 'solidarity economy', as seen in countries confronting crises in the past.

While indicative of citizens' capacity to self-organize in order to tolerate, absorb, cope with and adjust to the environmental and social threats posed by neoliberal policies in order to cover basic and urgent needs regarding food, shelter, health, childcare and education, these informal networks are also attempting to change an economic system increasingly perceived as unfair by building an alternative system within it based on greater mutual solidarity between individuals and the environment. That means that unlike more 'classic' social movements, such informal networks are much more involved in constructive and thoroughly organized forms of dissent towards contemporary capitalism and its transnational organization by promoting and diffusing innovative economic practices throughout society.

Despite the rapid growth of grassroots economic activism, there is still currently very little information available. The purpose of this special issue is to gather empirical studies that might shed light on new forms of self-organization that address both the intensification of economic problems and the difficulties of rebuilding social bonds and solidarity within society, emphasizing solidarity as a means by which to re-embed the economic system within social relations, starting from a local level. We are particularly interested in collecting contributions that address the organizational aspects, the individual stories and biographical consequences of this form of activism, as well as the role of the political representation of these organizations and their ability to influence decision-making processes. Comparative studies will be particularly appreciated, but theoretical considerations and in-depth cases studies are also welcomed.

Submission procedure:

Articles, written in English, will be submitted to a peer review process according to the following schedule:
